



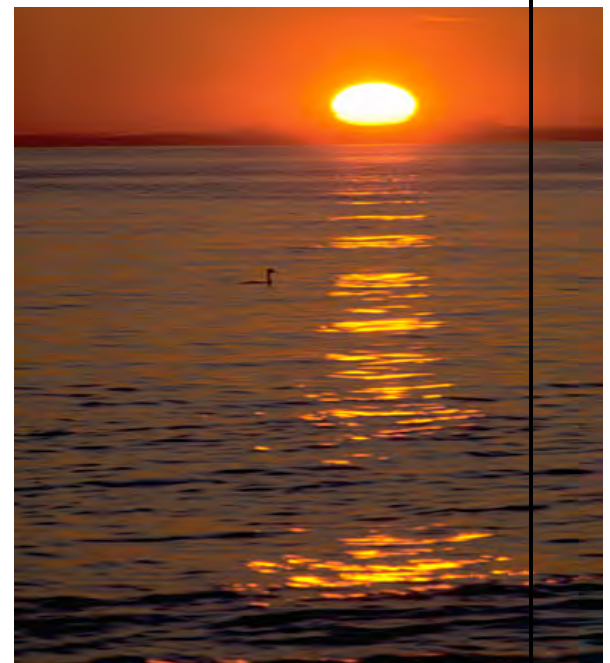

## Speakers' Biographies

**Justin Barrett:** After completing his Ph.D. in experimental psychology at Cornell University, Justin served on the psychology faculties of Calvin College and the University of Michigan and as a research fellow of the Institute for Social Research. He served as the associate director of the International Culture and Cognition Consortium and was a founding editor of the *Journal of Cognition and Culture*. His cross-cultural, developmental, and experimental research on religious concepts has appeared in numerous books and scholarly journals. His authored book, "*Why would anyone believe in God?*" (published by Ala Mira Press) will appear in May, 2004. Dr. Barrett currently provides part-time consulting on numerous research and evaluation projects for academic and nonprofit groups; but his full time occupation is stay-at-home dad, home schooling his ten-year-old son and eight-year-old daughter.

**Robert A. Emmons:** Robert A. Emmons, Ph.D. is Professor of Psychology at the University of California, Davis. He received his Ph.D. degree in Personality and Social Ecology from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He is the author of nearly 70 original publications in peer-reviewed journals or chapters in edited volumes, including the acclaimed book *The Psychology of Ultimate Concerns: Motivation and Spirituality in Personality* (Guilford Press). His research focuses on personal goals, spirituality, the psychology of gratitude and thankfulness, and subjective well-being. He has received research funding from the National Institute of Mental Health, the John M. Templeton Foundation, and the National Institute for Disability Research and Rehabilitation.

**Barbara L. Fredrickson:** Received her Ph.D. from Stanford University in 1990. She completed a postdoctoral fellowship on the psychophysiology of emotions at UC Berkeley. She is currently an Associate Professor of Psychology and Faculty Associate at the Research Center for Group Dynamics at the University of Michigan. Her research centers on emotions, especially positive emotions and emotional resilience. Her research is supported by grants from the NUMH and the University of Michigan. Her research and teaching have been recognized with numerous awards, including, in 2000, the largest prize awarded in psychology, the Templeton Positive Psychology Prize.

**Richard M. Lerner:** He is the Bergstrom Chair in Applied Developmental Science and the Director of the Applied Developmental Science Institute in the Eliot-Pearson Department of Child Development at Tufts University. A developmental psychologist, Lerner received a Ph.D. in 1971 from the City University of New York. He has been a fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences and is a fellow of the American Association for the advancement of Science, the American Psychological Association, and the American Psychological Society. Prior to joining Tufts University, he was on the faculty and held administrative posts at Michigan State University, Pennsylvania State University, and Boston College, where he was the Anita L. Brennan Professor of Education and the Director of the Center for Child, Family, and Community Partnerships. During the 1994-95 academic year, Lerner held the Tyner Eminent Scholar Chair in the Human Sciences at Florida State University. Lerner is the author or editor of 56 books and more than 385 scholarly articles and chapters. He edited Volume 1, "Theoretical Models of Human Development," for the fifth edition of the *Handbook of Child Psychology* (1998), edited (with Francine Jacobs and Donald Wertlieb) the four volume *Handbook of Applied Developmental Science* (2003), edited (with Laurence Steinberg) the second edition of the *Handbook of Adolescent Psychology* (2004), and is editing (with William Damon) the forthcoming sixth edition of the *Handbook of Child Psychology*. He is the founding editor of the *Journal of Research on Adolescence* and of *Applied Developmental Science* (2003). He is known for his work on the relations between life-span human development and contextual or ecological change. He has done foundational studies of the mutually influential relations between adolescents and their peer, family, school, and community contexts, and is a leader in the study of public policies and community-based programs aimed at the promotion of positive youth development.

**Michael E. McCullough:** Dr. McCullough is an associate professor in the Department of Psychology and the Department of Religious Studies at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Florida. He is a previous recipient of the Margaret Gorman Early Career Award from Division 36 and received a John Templeton Foundation/American Psychological Association Award for Research in Positive Psychology. Dr. McCullough's current research and scholarship focus on: (a) the development of religiousness and spirituality across the life course; (b) the social and psychological foundations for traditional virtues such as forgiveness and gratitude; and, (c) the associations of the above mentioned concepts with physical health, psychological well-being, and social relationships.

**Ralph L. Piedmont:** is a professor in the Department of Pastoral Counseling at Loyola College in Maryland. Dr. Piedmont received his Ph.D. in personality psychology from Boston University following which he received a two-year postdoctoral fellowship at the National Institute of Aging where he worked with Paul Costa Jr. and Robert McCrae. The focus of his work was on the five-factor model of personality and its utility as a predictive model of personality's impact on mental and physical health outcomes. Building on this foundation, Dr. Piedmont has developed a motivational measure of spirituality called Spiritual Transcendence. His research with this instrument has shown its predictive value in nonclinical, substance abuse, medical, and cross-cultural samples. He is well published in the areas of both personality and psychology of religion. Currently he is co-editor (along with David Moberg) of *Research in the Social Scientific Study of Religion* and sits on the editorial boards of a number of journals in both psychology and counseling, including *Counseling & Values*, *Journal of Personality Assessment*, and *Assessment*.

**P. Scott Richards:** Received his Ph.D. in counseling psychology in 1988 from the University of Minnesota. He is a professor in the Department of Counseling Psychology and Special Education at Brigham Young University. Dr. Richards is co-author and co-editor of several books that have been published by the American Psychological Association (APA) including *A Spiritual Strategy for Counseling and Psychotherapy* (1997), *Handbook of Psychotherapy and Religious Diversity* (2000), and *Casebook for a Spiritual Strategy in Counseling and Psychotherapy* (2004). In 1999, he was awarded the William C. Bier Award from Division 36 (Psychology of Religion) of APA. He is currently President-elect of Division 36. Dr. Richards is a licensed psychologist and maintains a small private psychotherapy practice at the Center for Change in Orem, Utah.

**Jan Sinnott:** Is professor of psychology in the Psychology Department at Towson University, Baltimore, MD ([jsinnott@towson.edu](mailto:jsinnott@towson.edu)). She received her Masters and Doctorate from The Catholic University of America, Washington, DC, specializing in positive cognitive development during adulthood and aging. After experience as a postdoctoral fellow and a Guest Scientist at the National Institute on Aging she developed her theory of Complex Post-formal Thought, supporting it with more than 20 years of research and applications in all the individual and personal domains of behavior in which complex problems of living can be found. Her numerous publications include her book, *The Development of Logic in Adulthood: Postformal Thought and its Applications* (Plenum). Three areas of life involving complex thinking are the university as a teacher of adults, spiritual development, and felt connection or "community" and development during adulthood. These are her current areas of research and writing. Her private practice has a humanistic/transpersonal orientation and is located in Towson.



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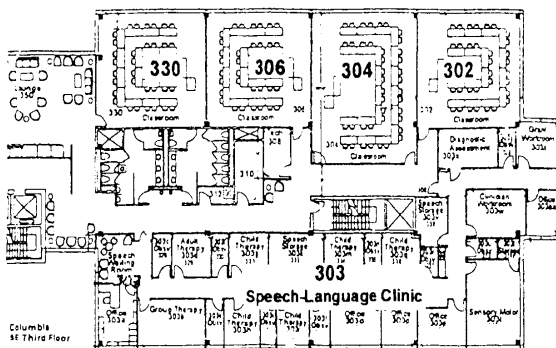
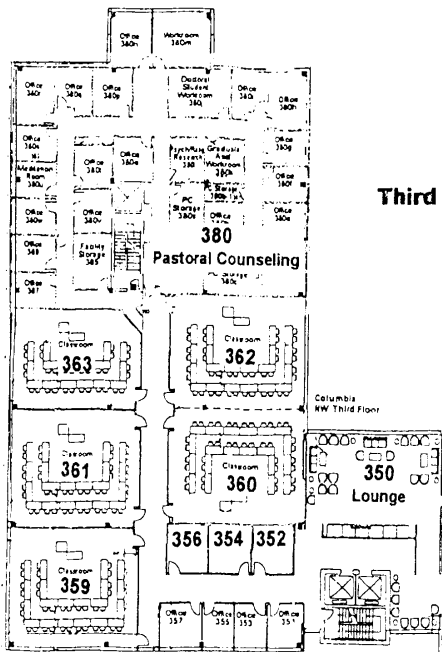
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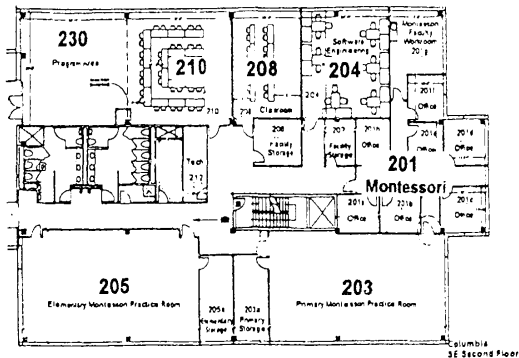
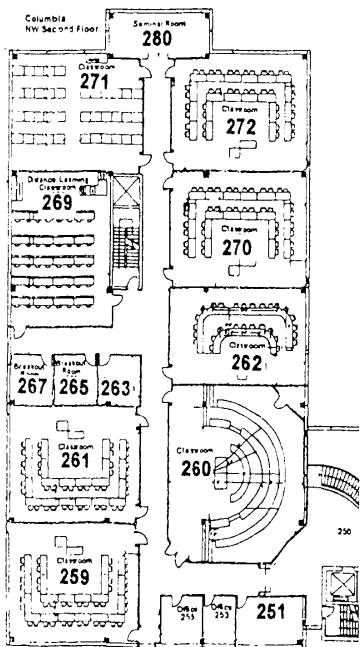
