

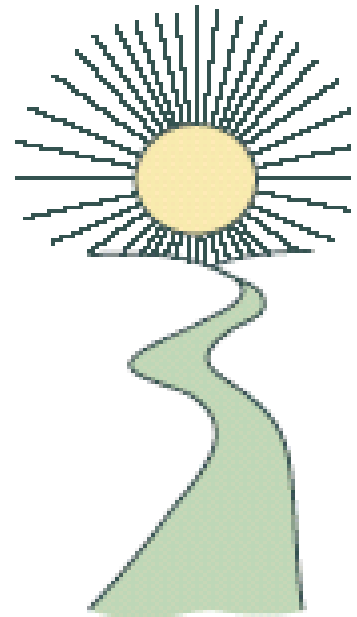

Speakers' Biographies

Robert A. Emmons, Ph.D. is Professor of Psychology at the University of California, Davis. He received his Ph.D. degree in Personality and Social Ecology from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and his Bachelor's degree from the University of Southern Maine. He is the author of over 80 original publications in peer-reviewed journals or chapters in edited volumes, including the books *The Psychology of Ultimate Concerns: Motivation and Spirituality in Personality* (Guilford Press), *Words of Gratitude for Body, Mind, and Soul* (Templeton Foundation Press), and *The Psychology of Gratitude* (Oxford University Press). Past-President of APA's Division 36, The Psychology of Religion and Spirituality, he is Editor-in-Chief of *The Journal of Positive Psychology*. His research focuses on personal goals, spirituality, the psychology of gratitude and thankfulness, and subjective well-being. He has received research funding from the National Institute of Mental Health, the John M. Templeton Foundation, The Institute for Research on Unlimited Love, and the National Institute for Disability Research and Rehabilitation (U.S. Department of Education). His research has been featured in dozen's of popular media outlets including the USA Today, U.S. News and World Report, Newsweek, Time, NPR, The Paul Harvey Show, The Osgood Radio Files, and Reader's Digest.

James W. Jones, Psy.D., Ph.D., TH.D. has earned doctorates in both Religious Studies and Clinical Psychology, as well as an honorary doctorate from the University of Uppsala in Sweden. He is a distinguished professor of Religion and adjunct professor of Clinical Psychology at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, New Jersey, a lecturer in Psychiatry and Religion at Union Theological Seminary in New York; an adjunct professor of Medical Humanities at Drew University, and a visiting professor at the University of Uppsala in Sweden. He is the author of ten books, including *Contemporary Psychoanalysis and Religion* (Yale University Press, 1991), *Religion and Psychology in Transition* (Yale University Press, 1996), and *Terror and Transformation: The Ambiguity of Religion* (Routledge Press, 2002), over twenty professional papers and book chapters. He maintains a private practice as a clinical psychologist. Dr. Jones has been invited to lecture in Europe and the United States on the psychological roots of religious terrorism.

Jacqueline S. Mattis, Ph.D. is Associate Professor of Applied Psychology in the Steinhardt School of Education of New York University. Her research focuses on the meanings and functional significance of religion and spirituality. In particular, she explores 1) the meanings of religiosity and spirituality for African Americans, 2) the factors that inform religious and spiritual involvement, 3) and the impact of religious and spiritual ideologies and practices on such positive psychological outcomes as altruism, volunteerism, forgiveness, and optimism. Her research has been published in numerous academic journals and texts including *The Journal of Community Psychology*, the *Journal of Adult Development*, *Personality and Individual Differences*, *Violence Against Women*, and *The Journal of Clinical Child Psychology*. She sits on the Editorial boards of the *Journal of Black Psychology* and the *Psychology of Women Quarterly*.

Mark R. McMinn, Ph.D. received his Ph.D. in clinical psychology in 1983 from Vanderbilt University. He is currently the Rech Professor of Psychology at Wheaton College (IL) where he teaches in their APA-accredited doctoral program in clinical psychology and coordinates the Center for Church-Psychology Collaboration. Dr. McMinn has authored over 100 articles and chapters and is author, co-author, or co-editor of 11 books including *Psychology and the Church* (2005), *Finding Our Way Home* (2005), *Why Sin Matters* (2004), *Spiritual formation, counseling, and psychotherapy* (2003), *Care for the Soul* (2001), and *Psychology, Theology, and Spirituality in Christian Counseling* (1996). He is a licensed psychologist, board certified by the American Board of Professional Psychology, and maintains a small clinical practice limited to clergy. He is President-elect of Division 36.

Lisa Miller, Ph.D. is a tenured Associate Professor in the Clinical Psychology Program at Teachers College, Columbia University. Her ongoing research and clinical work explore the centrality of the spiritual path in growth and psychological healing. Recently she and her research team have conducted a series of qualitative and quantitative studies on spiritual development associated with specific chapters in human development, such as adolescence and parenthood. Her mentoring of clinical students focuses on the development of spiritual awareness.

Leonard Sperry, M.D., Ph.D. is Professor and Coordinator of the Doctoral Program in Counseling at Florida Atlantic University and Clinical Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioral Medicine at the Medical College of Wisconsin. A fellow of the APA Division of Psychology of Religion and Spirituality, an ABPP diplomate in Clinical Psychology and an ABPN diplomate in Psychiatry, he has authored several books including *Spirituality in Clinical Practice: Incorporating the Spiritual Dimension in Psychotherapy and Counseling*; *Sex, Priestly Ministry and the Church*; *Transforming Self and Community: Revisioning Pastoral Counseling and Spiritual Direction*; *Ministry and Community: Recognizing, Healing and Predicting Ministry Impairment*; and co-edited *Spiritually-Oriented Psychotherapy* recently published by APA Books.

Everett L. Worthington, Jr., Ph.D. is Professor and Chair of the Department of Psychology at Virginia Commonwealth University (second largest state university in Virginia). He is also a licensed Clinical Psychologist in Virginia. He has published 20 books and over 200 articles and scholarly chapters, mostly on forgiveness, marriage, and family topics. He has a new book, *Forgiving and Reconciling* (InterVarsity Press, 2003), and one forthcoming in May 2005, *Handbook of Forgiveness* (Brunner-Routledge). He directs *A Campaign for Forgiveness Research* (www.forgiving.org), a non-profit organization that supports research into forgiving and works to build a field of studying forgiveness scientifically. He considers his mission as "to bring forgiveness into every willing heart, home, and homeland."



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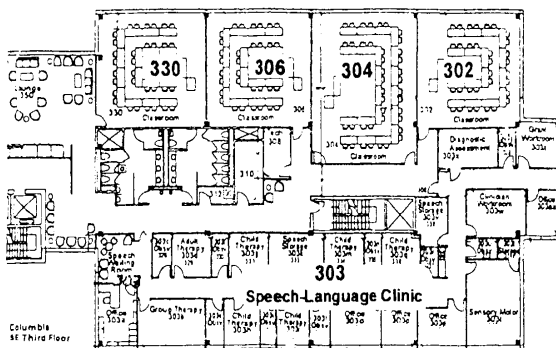
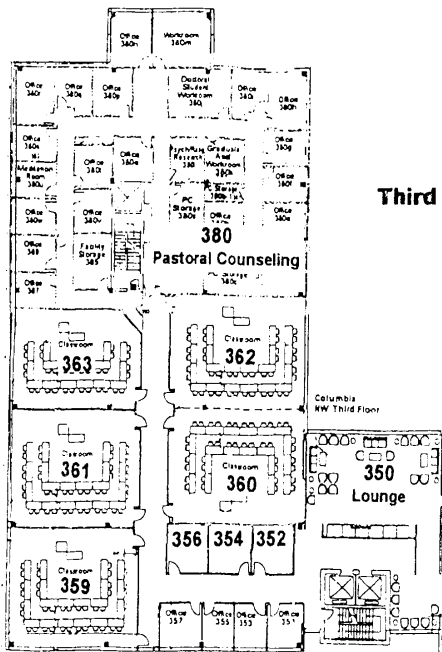
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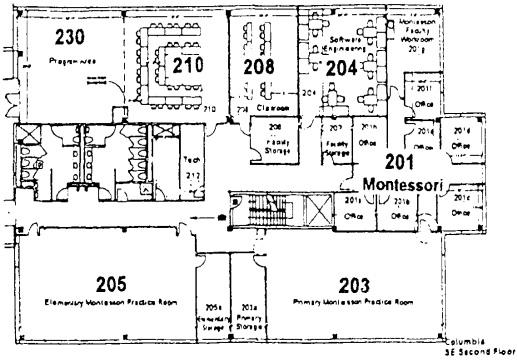
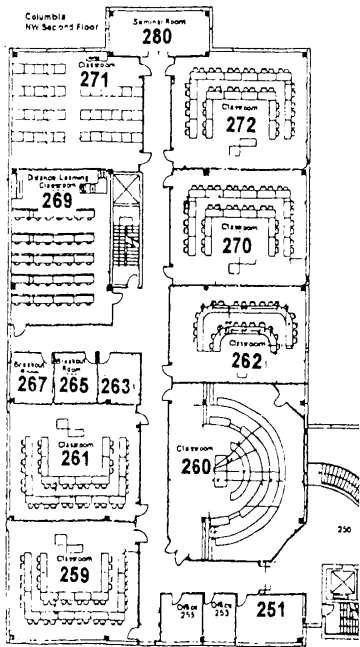
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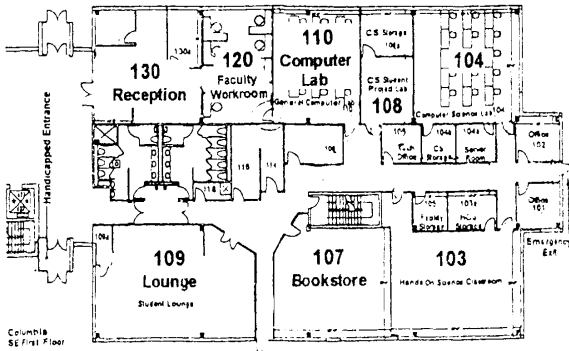
