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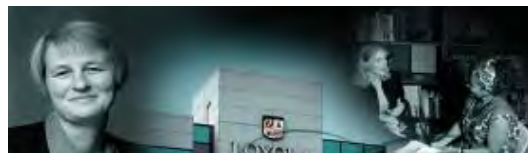

Richard Gorsuch, Ph.D.

On the Limits of Scientific Investigation: Miracles



Richard Gorsuch is a prolific researcher, best known for his studies in research methods and psychology of religion.

A Senior Professor of Psychology at the Graduate School of Psychology, Fuller Theological Seminar, his major books include *Factor Analysis* (2nd edition) and the *Psychology of Religion: An Empirical Approach* (Spilka, Hood, Hunsberger, and Gorsuch).

His most recent book, *Integrating Psychology and Spirituality?*, will be available in paperback, spring, 2007. He is a fellow of the Society for the Scientific Study of Religion and Divisions 36 and 5 of APA

Ralph W. Hood, Jr., Ph.D.

The Contemporary Christian Serpent Handlers of Appalachian



Ralph W. Hood Jr. is professor of psychology at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. He is a past president of the division of the Psychology of Religion of the American Psychological Association and a recipient of its William James Award.

He is a former editor of the *Journal for the Scientific Study Religion* and a former co-editor of *The International Journal for the Psychology of Religion*. He is currently a co-editor of the *Archiv für Religionpsychologie*.

He has published hundreds of papers on the psychology of religion and has authored, co-authored and edited nine books. Of most relevance to his talk is, *Handling Serpents: Pastor Jimmy Morrow's Narrative History of his Appalachian Jesus' Name Tradition* published by Mercer University Press, 2003.

Roland R. Griffiths, Ph.D.

Psilocybin and the Frontier of Experimental Mysticism



Roland R. Griffiths Ph.D., is Professor in the Departments of Psychiatry and Neurosciences at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine.

His principal research focus in both clinical and preclinical laboratories has been on the behavioral and subjective effects of mood-altering drugs. His research has been largely supported by grants from the National Institute on Health and he is author of over 300 journal articles and book chapters.

He has been a consultant to the National Institutes of Health, and to numerous pharmaceutical companies in the development of new psychotropic drugs. He is also currently a member of the Expert Advisory Panel on Drug Dependence for the World Health Organization. He has an interest in meditation and is Principal Investigator of the psilocybin research initiative at Johns Hopkins.

Jean Kristeller, Ph.D.

Dimensions of Spiritual and Religious Engagement



Dr. Kristeller is a clinical and psychologist whose primary focus of research has been on self-regulatory processes of emotion and health.

She has been engaged in research on the role of religiousness and spirituality in adjustment to cancer, and in modulating drinking behavior in college students (with her colleague Dr. Tom Johnson). She has also conducted research on various aspects of meditation practice for most of her career, including physiological, emotional, behavioral and spiritual effects.

Her research on spirituality and meditation-based treatment of eating disorders/obesity has been supported by funding from the Metanexus Institute and the NIH National Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicine. She has recently received funding for a national research conference on meditation and spirituality.

She holds a doctorate in clinical psychology from Yale University, and has been on the staff of the Behavioral Medicine services at Cambridge Hospital and the Univ. of Massachusetts Medical School.

She has also traveled and worked extensively in Asia, including Japan, Thailand, and Indonesia.

Deborah van Deusen Hunsinger, Ph.D.

Keeping an Open Heart in Troubled Times: Self-Empathy as a Christian Spiritual Practice



Deborah van Deusen Hunsinger, Ph.D. is associate professor of pastoral theology at Princeton Theological Seminary. A Fellow in the American Association of Pastoral Counselors, she worked as a practicing pastoral counselor for nearly 15 years before she began full-time teaching in 1993.

Deborah earned her M.Div. from Yale University Divinity School, and her M.Phil. and Ph.D. from Union Theological Seminary in New York City in the program of psychiatry and religion.

An ordained Presbyterian minister, she is interested in educating clergy and laypeople to offer theologically sound and psychologically informed pastoral care in the church. Her first book, *Theology and Pastoral Counseling: A New Interdisciplinary Approach* (Wm. B. Eerdmans, 1995) investigated key conceptual issues in the interdisciplinary relationship between theology and depth psychology in the specialized ministry of pastoral counseling.

After she began teaching at Princeton Seminary; her interests gravitated toward the pastoral care of congregations. Her second book, *Pray without Ceasing: Revitalizing Pastoral Care* (Wm. B. Eerdmans, 2006) came out last August. Arguing that prayer is the very heart of the church's life together, the book seeks to assist in revitalizing congregations through practices of mutual pastoral care.

In the past few years, Deborah has undergone intensive training in Nonviolent Communication (NVC), a mode of consciousness and set of skills that promote compassionate and honest relationships, which she has adapted for work in the church. NVC was created by Marshall Rosenberg more than 40 years ago and has been developed in various contexts by a variety of psychologists, educators, trainers, and social activists.

It is now an international training and peacemaking organization that facilitates connection and mutual respect among individuals, groups and even representatives of nations at war. Her lecture at this conference comes out of the profound impact NVC has had in her life and teaching.

She is married to theologian, George Hunsinger, who also teaches at Princeton Theological Seminary and is founder of the National Religious Campaign Against Torture. They have two grown daughters and two granddaughters.

Kevin Masters, Ph.D.

Psychophysiological Reactivity to Stress: A Possible Bridge Between Religion and Health



Dr. Kevin Masters is Associate Professor of Psychology and Director of Clinical Training at Syracuse University in Syracuse, NY.

He also holds an appointment in the Department of Psychiatry at SUNY – Upstate Medical University and is a member of the Center for Health and Behavior at Syracuse University and the Center for Integrated Healthcare sponsored by the Veterans Administration.

Dr. Masters serves as Associate Editor of the *Journal of Behavioral Medicine*, Editor of *the Health Psychologist*, and as a reviewer for the annual conventions of the American Psychological Association (Division 38) and the Society of Behavioral Medicine as well as numerous professional journals.

He is currently co-chair of a task force sponsored by Division 38 of APA to explore models of training in health psychology and he is actively involved with the Syracuse University Spirituality Research Group, an interdisciplinary team of scholars probing the meaning and effects of spirituality among college students.

Dr. Masters first published research on religion and psychological health while working in the laboratory of Dr. Allen Bergin in the late 1980's. His interests have since developed to include investigations of religion and cardiovascular health and he recently published a meta-analysis on distant intercessory prayer and healing along with general reviews on prayer and health.

William A. Richards, Ph.D.

**Psilocybin and the Frontier of Experimental
Mysticis**

William A. Richards is a psychologist in the Psychiatry Department of the Johns Hopkins



University School of Medicine, Bayview Medical Center, currently pursuing research with entheogens, and also a clinician in private practice in Baltimore

His graduate degrees include M.Div. from Yale Divinity School, S.T.M. from Andover-Newton Theological School and Ph.D. from Catholic University, as well as studies with Abraham Maslow at Brandeis University and with Hanscarl Leuner at Georg-August University in Göttingen, Germany, where his involvement with psilocybin research originated in 1963.

From 1967 to 1977, he pursued psychotherapy research with LSD, DPT, MDA and psilocybin at the Maryland Psychiatric Research Center, including protocols designed to investigate the promise of entheogens in the treatment of alcoholism, severe neuroses, narcotic addiction and the psychological distress associated with terminal cancer, and also their use in the training of religious and mental-health professionals. From 1977-1981, he was a member of the psychology faculty of Antioch University in Maryland.

His publications began in 1966 with "Implications of LSD and Experimental Mysticism," coauthored with Walter Pahnke, and published in the Journal of Religion and Health.

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Division 36: Psychology of Religion ***American Psychological Association***

Background:

Division 36 of the American Psychological Association, *Psychology of Religion*, brings together psychologists who recognize the significance of religion both in the lives of people and to the discipline of psychology. The division is nonsectarian. Membership and division activities are open to members of all faiths as well as to those who are not religiously affiliated or do not profess a particular personal faith commitment.

The organization was established originally in 1949 as the *American Catholic Psychological Association (ACPA)*. In 1970 it was renamed *Psychologists interested in Religious Issues (PIRI)*, and in 1976 PIRI officially became Division 36 of the APA.

In 1993, by vote of the membership, the division was renamed *Psychology of Religion*. We are indebted to that farsighted group of ACPA members who recognized that mainstream psychology did not have an organization through which psychologists could easily express their interests in the psychology of religion.

This area is one of the oldest in psychology; research on religion development and experience was conducted over a century ago, and both William James and G. Stanley Hall were leading psychologists of religion. Division 36 is working to re-establish the scientific psychology of religion to the respected status it once held so firmly in our discipline.

A wide variety of psychological interests and activities exist among the members of the division. Members work in virtually every area, from experimental and statistical research to clinical work with children and adults. We are concerned with both the scientific and applied aspects of our field.

Many members do research exclusively on issues in the psychology of religion; others bring this interest to bear on a variety of allied areas in psychology. Our professional affiliates may be found working in sociology, religious studies, and other social sciences. Some members also possess clerical degrees, and integrate psychology with the requirements of a pastoral life as researchers and practicing clinicians.

The psychology of religion is integral to understanding human behavior in the widest possible sense. As a division of APA, our basic role is to show how the psychological study of religion contributes to a scientific understanding of human nature.

Purpose:

The purpose of Division 36 is twofold:

1. To encourage the development of research, theory, and practice in the psychology of religion and related areas; and,
2. To facilitate the dissemination of research data on religious and allied issues, and effect the integration of these data with current psychological research, theory, and practice.

Membership:

You may apply for membership in Division 36 at a level consistent with your status in APA. Members, associates, and fellows of APA are eligible for Division 36 members, associate, and fellow status, respectively. Student affiliates of APA may apply for student affiliate status in the Division as well. Nonmembers of APA may apply for professional affiliate status. Applications for this status must meet the eligibility requirements for membership in APA and be approved by the Division's Executive Committee.

Membership includes a number of benefits, including the division newsletter, reduced registration fees for the Mid Year Research Conference, reduced subscription prices for select journals in the field, and professional contacts in our field. Most valuable are opportunities for participating in the annual convention and divisional affairs. These allow a kind of personal and intellectual stimulation not available elsewhere.

The Danielsen Institute offers several clinical training programs: a practicum-level training program for Boston University students in Social Work, Clinical Psychology, and Counseling Psychology and Religion; an APA-approved psychology internship training program; an advanced social work training program for LCSWs; and a limited postdoctoral psychology program that includes clinical and research positions.
